R. B. Kellogg has discontinued his work in the University to accept the position of principal of the Tobias High School. He will, however, secure his degree in June.

Professor Heald, who was called to Iowa a few days ago by the death of Mrs. Heald's mother, has telegraphed Professor Bessey that he will be unable to return until Saturday. In the mean time his classes are being looked after by Professor Bessey and Dr. Clements.

Two packages of plants from the Caucasus Mountains were received by the University Herberium Wednesday. They contain about two hundred specimens and are proving to be very interesting to the botanists of the University. They were sent in exchange for a set of Dr. Clements Rocky Mountain plants.

An appropriation of three thousand dollars to be used by Professor Bruner in field work in the investigation of injurious insects has been recommended by the standing committee in the legislature. The Department of Entomology had asked for an appropriation of five thousand dollars to be used in this work and the committee recommended the above amount.

In the original plan for the history of the state of Nebraska, the territorial history was to have occupied one of the two volumes but since the work began so much has been found on the history of the territory that it is to be treated in two volumes itself.

The first volume will soon be ready for publication and will consist of the political history of Nebraska as a ter-

Supt. B. E. Dill, of Johnson county, has been doing considerable work, in the Department of Geology, under the direction of Dr. Condra. Mr. Dill has organized his teachers into a class for the study of the Geology of that county, and will investigate the structure. topography and water resources. The results of the investigations of well water of that county are the most complete yet sent in to the State Geological Survey. About two hundred and fifty well records were received in the department this week. These reports include data on the kinds, amount, accessibility and use of water in Johnson county. This information will be incorporated in a report of that part af the state to be issued some time in the future.

A circular announcement from the committee on congresses at the Lewis & Clark exposition has been received at the Registrar's office. A number of national associations are planning to take advantage of this opportunity of combining annual business with pleasure, among which are the American Library Association, the American Medical Society, the Conference on Civics, Conference on Relations of Employer and Employe, the Conference on Indian Affairs, etc.

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
