Campus Gleanings

Delta Delta Delta entertained informally Saturday evening at the chapter house.

Prof. Goss spoke in the chapel this morning at 9 o'clock on "Locomotive Performance."

O. T. Swan, '04, is now in the government Bureau of Forestry, and is located in Washington.

The missionary committee is called to meet tomorrow morning at 11 a. m. in the Y. W. C. A. rooms.

The person seen to take pocketbook from locker 125 in the shop last Wednesday will return same at once to locker or tool room and avoid being reported.

The Forest club of the University will meet March 18 at 8 p. m. in N 102. C. G. Bates will discuss "Pine Ridge" and C. M. Dunn will give a talk on "Arbor Lodge."

F. E. Denney has completed his paper on "Crown Gall," which is to be published in the State Horticultural report. It is a summary of the present knowledge of this obscure disease.

An extended paper on the "Rusts and Smuts of the Cereals" has just been completed by C. A. Jensen, a graduate student in the Department of Botany. It is to be published in the State Agricultural report.

The Department of Botany of the University has received an urgent request from Washington for another trained botanist to take a good position as an investigator. The salary of the position starts at one thousand dollars a year.

Another packet of plants came to Dr. Clements of the Department of Botany on Monday from Tiflis in Transcaucasia for the University Herbarium. This makes all told about five hundred species which have been received from that region. They will be mounted and put in the Herbarium at once.

The State Geological Survey has received an industrial collection of artificial hollow block stone made of cement concrete by the Ruehle company, of Kankakee, Illinois. The collection will be displayed in connection with the cement brick and lime brick collection received some time ago.

Professor Bessey made a careful microscopic examination Saturday of the buds on the peach trees growing on his lot on R street in the city and found all the flowers dead. He does not expect to get any peaches from his trees this year. He has not yet examined buds from the peach orchards outside of the city.

The District Court of the Law school held a trial Saturday afternoon. McLain and Sprague were counsel for the plaintiff in error in the case of Cowan vs. Chase and Bagley and Jeteron were counsel for the defendant in error. The regular Monday evening lecture before the law students was not given last night. It is postponed until next Monday evening.


