Campus Gleanings

Where are you putting the Emphasis on Life? Hear Dr. F. S. Stein in Memorial Hall Sunday at three o'clock.

Professor Bessey began meeting his classes again on Saturday and hopes now to meet them regularly as usual.

An effort is being made to introduce a new department at Purdue for the purpose of teaching practical bread making.

Miss Nellie McFall's Girls' Choral Choir will sing in Memorial Hall Sunday at 3 p. m. All University students are welcome.

Harvard has been surpassed by Michigan this year in the number of students registered. Harvard has 4,086, Michigan 4,100.

Dr. Frank W. Smith, of the Department of Education, left Wednesday for Chicago, where he goes as a delegate to the Association of College and Secondary Teachers. He expects to spend several days in Chicago, examining the work of some of the secondary schools.

Mr. Shantz, a graduate student in botany, has discovered a plant which the experts pronounce to be new to science. He found it in the vicinity of Pike's Peak, Colorado.

Frank G. Bruner, who received a fellowship through the recommendation of the Department of Philosophy here read a paper at Yale on March 27. Its subject was "Racial Differences in the Upper Limit of Audibility."

The package of books for the Dendrology class has been received and are being distributed. They are Sargents "Manual of the Trees of North America." Professor Sargent is the foremost American botanist who makes a specialty of trees. A few years ago he published a large quarto work in fourteen volumes, which cost over three hundred dollars. The manual under consideration is an abridgement of this great work and will prove most useful to all botanists and foresters in the University.

Dr. Luckey has recently received an interesting letter from Dr. H. K. Wolfe formerly professor of Philosophy in the University, and principal of the Lincoln High School, the latter position which he recently resigned to occupy the chair of pedagogy in the University of Montana, where he is now located. Dr. Wolfe is quite enthusiastic over his new life in the northwest. He writes that the University of Montana is a thriving institution, but that the state legislature is less liberal in appropriations than the Nebraska legislature and this, together with the immense distances which students must travel to attend will prevent it from becoming a great university in his day.

A practice game was played Tuesday afternoon at the F. and M. park between the Academy baseball team and the Lincoln Business College nine. Manager Perry has secured a game with Cotner University for April 7. He is also trying to secure games with the class and society teams of the University and with Omaha and Ashland high schools. The baseball enthusiasts to the number of about twenty have been practicing on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday at the F. and M. park and the team is rapidly rounding into shape. The battery seems to be the weakest place in the team, so far, but it is expected that other candidates will be out in a few days who have better control of the sphere.
