Campus Gleanings

Dr. Clement's new book on "Research methods in Ecology" has been sent to the printer and he expects to have it out by the first of June.

Dr. Fred Kuhlman, a former fellow in the Department of Philosophy here, now a lecturer in Clarke University at Worcester, Mass., was a campus visitor yesterday.

F. G. Bruner has recently distinguished himself again. He has lately been given charge of the bureau for study of children by the board of education of Chicago.

W. J. Bryan will deliver a lecture before the students and faculty of the School of Agriculture next Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the Armory at the Farm. The topic on which he will speak has not yet been announced.

A short summary of the work of the meeting of the North Central College and Secondary School Association recently held in Chicago, written by Professor Smith, of the Department of Education, will occur in the Nebraskan in the near future.

Professor Miller, of the Department of Forestry, closed his University work for the year Saturday and left the city for Washington where he reports for duty in the United States Forest Service. He will remain in the government service until about September 15th when he expects to return to the University.

Two more new "pets" in the shape of Shorthorn steers have been added to the University herd at the Farm. Prof. Smith has been untiring in his efforts to bring together some of the best bovine specimens available to be used for demonstration purposes before students and for the University exhibit at the State Fair and International Stock Show at Chicago.

Edwin R. Mockett, Supreme Court Reporter, president of the County Sunday School Association, gave a very interesting and instructive lecture before the students in the class of Education 20 on Friday. He told of some of the practical points that he had derived from his experiences in connection with the Sunday schools of the country.

The first installation of the Sombrero went to press Saturday afternoon. The contract, which includes the printing and binding of over one thousand copies, has been let to Jacob North & Co., and is said to be the largest contract of any student publication ever given in the University. The work on the book will continue steadily for four weeks, when it is expected that the annual will be completed and ready for sale.
