attention.

A call has been made for men to re-

it is planned to carry on practice more
systematically than ever before, and
it is the duty of every football man in
school to report in logs Monday. In-
valuable knowledge of the fundamen-

is a great help later on. Close indi-
vidual work will be given each man
by Capt. Borg, Ed. Gert, Benedict and
Asst. Coach Westover. Such close
individual attention cannot be given
in the fall.

From twenty to fifty men are an-
swering spring practice calls at other
institutions where the football sched-
ules for the coming season aren't to
be compared with ours. We can hard-
ly do less along this line.
