May 1st the Limit.

Applications of the various candidates for places as student members of the athletic board must be in the hands of the secretary of the board, Dr. Clapp, by the evening of May 1st. Failure to comply with the following section of Article XIV of the athletic board constitution will render the candidate ineligible.

Sec. 1. Nominations. Any university student in good standing may become a candidate, on petition signed by twenty students filed with the secretary of the board before—(May 1st, this year), together with a statement in writing from said student that he desires to be a candidate and expects to be in the University during the coming year. Petitions in duplicate are to be posted in the gymnasium and university hall for five days and in lack of protest accepted by the athletic board. All names of candi-
