In Other Colleges

The students of Kansas University are asking that a "K" be awarded to their intercollegiate debaters.

Harvard won in the annual debate with Yale. The question debated on was the regulation of railway rates.

Ed. Parry, of the University of Chicago, hurled the disc almost three feet beyond the world's record on Tuesday. The record is 133 feet, 6 1/2 inches. Parry threw the disc 136 feet, 4 inches.

The faculty of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, 57 to 5, disapproved the proposed alliance with Harvard. The matter will now be submitted to the alumni of the institute and then the trustees will decide what further action shall be taken.

The free admission plan which went into effect at the University of Chicago last Monday has become popular in the extreme. All games on Marshall field are now very largely attended. The plan has been under consideration by President Harper and Coach Stagg for some time, and it will be given a thorough test.

Not only the students of Iowa, but also of the University of Missouri are calling for a systematic organization of intercollegiate debating work. The long series of defeats which Missouri has suffered at the hands of schools where the debating work is systematized has shown her students the defects of a system based on individual and competing debating societies.

As a result of investigations that have been going on for some time Edward C. O'Brien, managing editor of the Gopher of 1904 and a senior at the University of Minnesota, was expelled yesterday by a unanimous vote of the faculty on charges of misappropriating money. A recommendation also was sent to the Board of Regents that O'Brien and Charles Sainsbury, business manager of the Gopher, be prohibited from ever again entering the university or from receiving any degree. The amount involved is from \$750 to \$1,000, belonging to the class and placed in their trust during the compiling and publishing of the Junior paper.

With a view to making football more open than it now is, a radical change has been made in the rules of the game by the Intercollegiate Football Rules Committee. The forward pass is to be allowed next year. Robert D. Wrenn of Harvard, is said to be the only member of the committee who strongly advocated the change. He did so because President Elliot objects so strongly to the present form of the game that, unless some changes were made, Harvard might have to give up playing football.

The faculty of Cornell University has instituted an important ruling to the effect that no man shall be allowed more than fourteen days' leave of absence for athletics during the college year. This rule is to take effect next fall.
