DE WITT BRISTOL BRACE.

The University of Nebraska has suffered an irreparable loss by the death of Dr. Brace. One of the oldest professors in the University, he was also one of the greatest, and it is due to him as much or more than to any other member of the faculty that our University has a reputation extending far beyond the borders of the state and nation,, and that it has reached its present high rank among the universities of the world.

If it is possible that any one department suffers more from his death than any other, it is the Physics department, of which he has been the head for eighteen years. It is to him that credit must be given for the high standard reached and maintained by

The University secured the ball on the thirty-five yard line and after several downs, Schmidt kicked to Minor, who returned to the twenty-five yard line. The high school tried a fake kick, but did not gain. Taylor was taken back and given the ball, making two five yard gains. Weller was sent over for the final score, directly in front of the goal posts. Cotton missed goal. Score, 20-0. The rest of the game was a punting contest between Schmidt and Minor, with the result in favor of the latter.
