Excursion to Minnesota.

A desperate effort is being made by the football management to procure such a rate to Minnesota for the big game as to insure a great excursion. Since the rate war of four years ago, when a three-dollar round trip rate was made by one of the roads, nothing resembling a fair rate has been offered by the railroads, which have agreed not to cut so low again. Already this year one of the Lincoln agents has requested the Western Passenger Association at Chicago to make a general rate of over ten dollars, which would, of course, mean no excursion, as no one wishes to spend a year's expenses to see even the Minnesota game. Manager Morrison is going to enter into negotiation with the different roads which run to Minneapolis, however, and attempt to procure a round trip rate of six dollars, good from two days before the game until the day after. To proque this rate it is absolutely necessary that he be able to make a definite pledge of a certain number of tickets to the railroad company, and in order to do this, he has circulated a number of lists for those who will agree to go at this rate to sign. As some move must be made within three or four days, these pledges should be made as soon as possible. There is no reason why at least five hundred students alone should not take advantage of this offer, especially the Freshmen, who have never had a chance to go on a football excursion before, and the Seniors, who will never have a chance again during their undergraduate life.

One of these lists will probably be left in the Library entrance hall, so that all may have an opportunity to sign. There will also be one in the editorial offices of the Nebraskan.

Cross Country Men to Meet.

There will be a meeting of all the men who are interested in cross country work in Dr. Clapp's office tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock. The purpose of the meeting is to arouse interest in cross country work and induce a large number of men to try for the team which is to represent Ne-Meet to be held Thanksgiving morning in Chicago. Last year the five men from Nebraska won the event by a wide margin, despite all sorts of hard luck, and we now hold the cup which is offered to the winning school. As all the western universities are represented at the contest, this is quite a feather in Nebraska's cap, and every effort should be made to duplicate the performance this year. The cup becomes the permanent possession of a school when won three consecutive times.

Of the team which represented Nebraska last year, two of the men are not in school, States and Hauser, although the latter will return next semester. This gives a good chance for a good runner to make the team, and it is expected that a large number will try for the open places. Practice runs are taken three times a week, and the men picked just before the time of the contest, so that a mediocre man will have an opportunity to de-
