Work of construction has begun on
a new automobile testing plant to be
installed at Purdue University. When
the work is completed Purdue will
have the only automobile testing plant
in the world as far as the authorities
at the University have been able to
learn. A platform twelve feet long
and six feet wide is being built to hold
any automobile, from a runabout to
the largest racing machine. The ma-
chine will be fastened to the platform
and anchored by a yoke to a traction
dynamo-meter and registering device
in the rear. The drive wheels will rest
on a drum at the rear of the platform.
When the drive wheels turn the effect
is at once noticed on the drums. The
result is registered on the speed indi-
cator and on the registering device
that indicates the horse power.
