Our Opponents.

Games not played on Nebraska field last Saturday gave Scarlet and Cream supporters much food for thought, and the dope fiend has already gotten out his guess stick and is figuring out how badly Doane is going to beat us. Out in the wilds of Colorado, where they learned to play the noble game of football a few years back, and where most of the present Dartmouth team was taught its abc's, thirty-five minutes of play was all that was needed to give the University of Colorado 109 points in a game with Sacred Heart College of Denver. This does look bad for us, even though the so-called college is nothing but a high school, for some people doubt whether our men could make that many points without any opponents. It gives every Nebraskan a pang of sorrow to see our old friend, who once dropped us from her schedule because we were not even a good practice game, reduced to that extremity herself. At her present rate of progress, she will soon reach the point where Drake will be her big game. It is certainly sad.

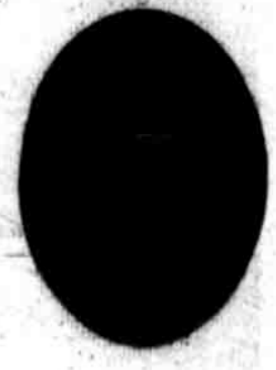
