SCORE 100 POINTS.

(Continued from page 1.) had his collar-bone broken. Other Creighton men received slight injuries. Taylor and Morse, two of Nebraska's first team men, were not in the game Saturday.

The game more in detail is:
First Half.

At 3:15 sharp both teams took their respective places, Nebraska defending the north goal. Creighton kicked off to Eager, who returned the ball fifteen yards. Nebraska failed to gain on line buck, but Little went around the end for fifteen yards, followed by Benedict and Johnson, who each made fifteen. Little made fifteen more, then Cotton was pushed over the line for a touchdown, just two minutes after Creighton had kicked off. Weller kicked goal. Score, 6-0. Nebraska kicked off to Creighton's fifteen yard line, and she returned the ball about ten yards. Creighton prepared to punt, but Borg broke through and blocked the punt. Benedict secured the ball, and ran twenty yards for a touchdown. Weller kicks goal. Score, 12-0.

The game was varied at this stage by Little and Johnson making a touchdown in two runs of about forty yards each. Weller kicked the goal. Score, 18-0. From this on the plays were merged into foot races of from ten to seventy-five yards each. Creighton could not hold us for downs at any time. The half ended with the score standing 41-0. Weller had failed to kick but one goal out of the seven chances.

Second Half.

Denslow went in at end this half instead of Benedict. Nebraska kicked off to Creighton on her own ten yard line. Creighton failed to gain on line buck, but on the next few plays they succeeded in hitting Nebraska's line for ten yards. But the old "stone wall" held firm and Creighton attempted to punt, but this was blocked and Little scooped up the ball, running twenty-five yards for touchdown. From this time on the touchdowns were made thick and fast. Denslow and Johnson alternated at chasing around the Omaha team's interference for long runs. Just to have, variety, Wilson, Little, Cotton, and Weller would tear through the Creighton line for good substantial gains.

When the score reached 86-0, Nebraska fumbled on her own thirty-five yard line. Here Creighton had her only chance to score and tried a place kick, but Borg and Cotton broke through, blocking the kick, and Denslow snatched up the ball and run seventy-five yards for a touchdown. Hereafter the game was only a matter of points. When the half and game closed the score stood 103-0 in favor of Nebraska. This is the largest score Nebraska ever ran up against her opponents in any game.

Lantz and Lundin went in the game for Wilson and Weller, respectively, during the second half.

Basketball Practice.

The initial basketball practice of the year will be this afternoon from four o'clock until five o'clock. Of last year's team, Captain Hoar, Bell, Mosher and Hagensick are in school again, and prospects are bright for a champion team, able to trim Minnesota once more. For the vacant position at forward there are a number of candidates from last year's second team, and with the usual bunch of Freshmen who are anxious to make the team, a fierce contest for positions is assured.
