Freshman Meeting.
 The Freshmen met harmoniously in the chapel yesterday morning and completed the election of officers. The following members of the class were elected to office by good-sized majorities:

- Vice-president—S. P. Dobbs.
- Secretary—Vera Fink.
- Treasurer—Lynn Fossler.
- Sergeant-at-Arms—Robert Taylor.

Following the election of officers, the class passed a motion, made by S. M. Rinaker, investing the president with power to appoint all the Freshman committees. The president was also directed to appoint an athletic committee of three and a resolution committee. The former committee will co-operate with a similar Sophomore committee to arrange an athletic carnival in which the two lower classes will be the participants. The proceeds of this carnival will be used to pay the damage done to the pipe-organ in Memorial Hall during the recent class election. Albert Jenkins, D. Harrison and R. J. Sears are the members of this committee.

The resolution committee, composed of S. M. Rinaker, James Benson, and Paul Burt, were instructed to draw up a resolution pledging the Freshman class to refrain from any unnecessary or barbaric manifestations of class spirit and to co-operate with the Sophomores in preserving peace between the two classes. This committee was also delegated to arrange a cane-rush with the second year class.

Moot Courts Sit.
 The Supreme and District courts of the College of Law convened Saturday for the first time in the new school year. A noticeable feature in the District court were the motions to quash proceedings, which were five in number, and one motion to strike from the files. This is a repetition of what has taken place in former years and is the result of too much haste on the part of the plaintiffs, and not enough time to go into all the details.

In the Supreme court, one cause was argued by Gibson and Parriott, attorneys for appellee, and Martin and Hutchinson, attorneys for appellant. The talks on both sides were evidences of careful work and were very good arguments.

Professor Fogg, after hearing the arguments, gave some very good pointers on how they might have been improved from a rhetorical standpoint.

The proceedings as a whole were pleasing and when it is taken into consideration that this was the first session of the courts and no great amount of time was possible for the preparation, there are good grounds to look forward to some excellent work in the moot courts in the future.
