Associated closely with Professor Hill has been Prof. W. W. Cook, formerly professor in the Nebraska College of Law at the University. Both were active workers, while here, in the debating line and upon taking up their work at Missouri began to take an active part in the intercollegiate debating.

allied to the present plan at Nebraska. Five faculty members and three student members constitute the board. The latter are selected as the faculty members shall direct. Heretofore the management and arrangement of debates has been in the hands of a debating society.

Last year, after the first Iowa-Nebraska debate, in which Nebraska received the unanimous decision of the judges, the Daily Iowan called upon the student body and the faculty to place their intercollegiate debating upon a university footing.
