HOLD TOURNAMENT

TO DECIDE THE INTER-CLASS BASKET-BALL CHAMPIONSHIP.

Kansas City Athletic Club to Hold Large Athletic Carnival at Kansas City in February.

Mrs. Clapp and Miss Pound are preparing for the girls' inter-class basketball tournament. They hope to be able to pull this event off before the beginning of the second semester. This is done in order that the girls' varsity basketball team may get down to work early. It is quite often the case that varsity material is developed in these class games.

The enthusiasm is as great in regard to this event at the present time as it was at the close of the season last year. The seniors were the victors in last year's event, and the class of '08, which gave them such a close race, seem to have a look in for the pennant this year, although they will have a hard race with the seniors. This event, being the one big event in girls' athletics of the year, is generally looked forward to with much anticipation by the co-eds.

The girls' varsity basketball team has not arranged any games as yet, but it is quite likely that they will have two or three hard games this year. It is sincerely hoped by the management that Minnesota will come here for a game. But, because of the disappointment Minnesota caused us last year, little hope can be entertained.

Dr. Clapp is in receipt of a letter from the Kansas City Athletic Club in regard to the big indoor athletic carnival to be held there in February. If this meet is carried out as intended there will be five representatives, Missouri Athletic Club, Kansas City Athletic Club, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska universities. A meet of this kind should prove a great success, as it prepares the men for the spring work, and really is right in line for the spring meets.

The size of the K. C. A. C. auditorium is such that nearly all the regular events could be carried on. Several of the long distance runs will be held as well as the fifty-yard dash. The fixed events will be running broad jump, pole vault, running high jump, shot put and probably one of the heavier weights.

The Nebraska Charter day athletic events, coming when they do, should prepare the varsity athletes for the Kansas City meet.

EXCELLENT LAW LECTURE.

Former Prosecuting Attorney to Explain Case.

Next Monday evening Mr. T. C. Munger, formerly prosecuting attorney of Lancaster county, will give a lecture before the students of the law college. He will take a transcript of the record of an actual criminal prosecution which he had handled, and will follow the case step by step. Dean Pound has had about a hundred copies of this transcript printed, so that each student will have one and thus be able to follow the lecturer closely in his explanation of the procedure. The copies are now being distributed in order that the students may acquaint themselves with the record before the lecture.

This lecture should have been given before the Christmas vacation, but owing to the difficulty with regard to the stenographic bureau the transcript could not be prepared in time for use at that time. Mr. Munger, instead of his regular lecture, gave an impromptu talk on criminal prosecutions in general.

Owing to the holidays, the Dramatic Club try-outs for parts in "The Merchant of Venice" have been postponed for one week and will be held Thursday evening, January 11th, from 7 to 10 o'clock. All members are urged to try-out and to signify their intention to some member of the cast committee immediately. It is desirable that scenes be worked up which include two or more characters.

Work is progressing nicely on the heating apparatus and the plumbing of the Administration building. The building will not be ready for occupation by the first of next semester, as it was at first thought. The management hopes now to have the building completed by April 1st.

Wisconsin Still Pondering.

Negotiations for the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate are, figuratively speaking, "still in the air." No compact has as yet been agreed upon, and, although the Badgers had their team selected before the holiday recess, no question has yet been submitted. This seemingly unnecessary delay in submitting the question for debate is entirely unsatisfactory to the debating board. It not only handicaps our men in the matter of preparation, but it also gives the Wisconsin team the advantage of two weeks' uninterrupted work on the question, a most valuable "lap" considering the nearness of the debating season. The truth is, the question should have been submitted two weeks ago.

There is also a contention relative to the date of the debate, Wisconsin favoring the latter part of April, whereas Nebraska prefers having everything "off its hands" by the beginning of the Easter recess. Exactly what will be done in this matter will probably be determined by the debating board which meets again today to discuss and, if possible, to settle two or three other important matters.

ATHLETIC BOARD

HOLDS MEETING TO DISCUSS COACH QUESTION.

Matter Left in the Hands of the Football Committee—Said to Be Many Applicants for the Position.

The University Athletic Board held a short meeting in Dr. Clapp's office during the convocation period yesterday morning in order to discuss the vital question of who is to coach the Cornhusker football team next season. The fame of the Nebraska team has evidently penetrated far and wide, for there were a large number of applicants for the position filled so well by Booth for the past six years. No definite action was taken by the board, it being decided that the best course would be to leave the entire matter to the football committee. This committee will look into the records and qualities of all the promising candidates for the position and will make its recommendations within the next couple of weeks.

The reference in yesterday's Nebraskan to the small amount collected from the training table men was noticed; and a member of the football committee made the statement that since the report in the paper had been prepared many of the men had paid up their assessments, so that now less than \$80 remains outstanding, and the men will give notes for this amount. It was also stated that it had always been the rule of the board to refuse sweaters to all men who were delinquent in this matter.

'08 Sweaters.

The class sweaters that were won by the sophomore class football team have arrived. They are fine gray vest sweaters with the class numerals, '08, in red. They are of the best quality of goods, being the finest vest-sweater made by the Spaulding company. Fourteen were awarded.
