ARTICLE V.

Selection of the Board of Managers. Section 1. The business manager shall be chosen from the Sophomore class. The president shall secure the approval of the editor-in-chief before making this appointment.

Sec. 2. The assistant managers shall be selected one each from the Junior and Sophomore classes and the Law College. The presidents shall secure the approval of the editor-in-chief and business manager before making these appointments.

Sec. 3. Business managers therefter in school shall act as advisory members of the Board of Managers.

ARTICLE VI. Artists.

The artists shall be selected by the Board of Editors.

ARTICLE VII.

Removal. The editor-in-chief shall have the sole power of removal.

ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. The business manager shall keep or cause to be kept a set of books showing all receipts and expenditures to date. Such books shall at all times be open to the inspection of the Faculty Auditing Committee.
