Open to all students. Continuation of

Special Teachers' Courses.
During the second semester Miss M.
H. Perley, supervisor of manual train-
ing in the Lincoln public schools, has
arranged two special teachers' courses
in manual training which will be open
to the young women of the University,
providing they formally register for
the work. One hour credit will be al-
lowed for either of these courses. The
work will consist of actual hand work
in manual training, together with lec-
tures and readings on the psychology
of the subject. The very great edu-
cational importance of this subject
should make this opportunity interest-
ing to those young women who expect
to become teachers.

Miss Perley is a graduate of the
manual training department of "Teach-
ers' College," of Columbia University,
New York, which is generally recog-
nized as the leading department of its
kind in the world. She has had exten-
sive experience before coming to
Lincoln and is in every way qualified
to make a success of these training
classes.

Teachers' Course in American History.
Prof. L. E. Aylsworth will give a
two-hour course in American History
next semester that may be counted
toward the University teachers' cer-
tificate.
This course will be devoted to the
methods, problems, needed and avail-
able materials, of the teaching, as op-
posed to the studying and writing of
history. A knowledge of the elements
of historical method, so essential to
the teachers of history, will be as-
