Science and Religion.

A course of lectures will be given next semester on the "Relation of Science and Religion." It will be a study of the grounds of religious belief from a scientific and philosophical point of view. Some of the principal topics considered will be: Scientific explanations of the origin of religion. principles of the evolution of religion. the psychology of religion, the idea of God and arguments for His existence as affected by science, philosophy and biblical criticism.

This course will be given by Professor French, Saturday mornings at 11 o'clock in room 109, Library Building. Students who merely attend the lectures and pass the examination on the same will receive one-half hour credit. Those who do in addition a certain amount of prescribed reading and writing may receive one hour credit. While this course is complete. in itself, it will also form a part of the regular course in the Philosophy of Religion (Philosophy 16). Those who wish to take this course of Saturday morning lectures by itself should register for Philosophy 16, with either one-half hour or one hour credit, as they prefer. Regular students in 16 will register for three hours.
