MUSEUM BUILDING.

This Is to Be One of the Best on the Campus,

The first signs of the Museum building appeared yesterday, when brick were seen piled up just northeast of University Hall. Work will be started upon this building just as soon as the weather will permit and pushed with all possible speed in order that it may be completed by September 1st, 1906. The contract calls for the completion of the building by this time. The architect for this building is T. R. Kimball of Omaha. Mr. Kimball's work is too widely known to comment upon it here, and it is needless to say that the style will be uptodate in every way. The contractor is W. D. Campbell of this city.

The building will be made of fireproof brick, and will form a wing to the old Nebraska Hall. The brick are known as the semi-vitrous brick of Kansas, and it is claimed that they are the highest grade of a building brick. The size of the wing is about fifty by seventy-five feet, and four stories high. The interior is to be finished in red oak , which will give it a very pleasant and bright effect.

This wing will be occupied by the department of Geology, which will have all laboratories, lecture rooms and offices in the first and second floors. The last two floors will be devoted to the University Museum.
