Miller, of Indiana, broke the state record in the high jump, at 5 feet 11 inches.

Marc Catlin, the star Chicago football player, is coaching the Iowa track team.

American Rhodes scholars captured three firsts and one second in the Oxford field sports last Monday.

Syracuse has been given the gift of a stadium to cost \$200,000. The athletic field in the center will be 525x337 feet.

At Chicago the Philosophy College consisting of women have formed a dramatic club which has been named "The Sock and Buskin."

The George Washington University has received \$1,000 each from E. H. Sothorn and Julia Marlowe to establish a chair of dramatic art.

Dean Judson of Chicago University has announced that absolute free speech will be permitted to students and faculty members alike. On the strength of this, a student delivered an oration which was an eulogy of Robert Ingersoll and a positive endorsement of his religious views.

Try-out for the American team, which will compete at Athens, will be held in New York this month, and the team will leave for Athens the second week in April. Hugo Friend and James D. Lightbody of Chicago University, have been extended invitations to compete by the Athenian games committee.

Chicago University has added a new course to its curriculum, called "Vacation Days in France, a Trip for Study and Pleasure." The course will cover a ten weeks' stay in Paris, under the direction and supervision of French professors there, and upon examination, will count for credit toward a school of education degree.

Will Casey, the star tackle of the Iowa Normal College at Cedar Rapids, has arrived in the city and has entered college. He is now located at the Phi Delta Theta house under the protecting wing of Capt. Joe Curtis. Casey is about 5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighs 210 pounds, is very fast on his feet, and was a sensational player in the Iowa game last year.—Michigan Daily.
