A collection of Russian documents and state papers has been presented to Columbia University by M. Witte, the Russian premier. The collection includes all the Russian state papers now in print, as well as copies of the Russian codes and reports on agricultural, census, finances and Siberian affairs. M. Witte last September received from the university the degree of doctor of laws.
