Basket Ball Team Leaves.
 Today the basket-ball team leaves for their northern trip. They will go from Lincoln to Omaha on the Burlington, and thence to Minneapolis on the Chicago Great Western. The stops made will be few, except at Omaha and Fort Dodge. It is the aim of the trip to have the men in the finest possible shape for the Minnesota game on Saturday. If Nebraska can defeat the Gophers in the game Saturday night it will give her a clear, undisputed Western championship.

The team had a good practice last night and the work was very fast. The team has improved a great deal in their passing and playing in general since the southern trip, and if they play the game on the trip that they are playing now, nothing but victories can be checked up against them. The first game on the trip will be with Bellevue College in Omaha tonight. The men who will accompany Manager Van Orsdel on the trip are: Captain Hoar, Hagensick, Paul Bell, Moser, Walsh, Meyer, Winter and D. Bell. It is quite likely the number will be cut down to seven, but up to the time of going to press this had not been settled.
