A majority of the members of the
Junior law class have endorsed the
following resolutions:

We, the members of the class of 1907
of the University of Nebraska Law
School, deplore the unmanly and un-
cleanly conduct of certain members of
this institution which has necessitated
the authorities placing cuspidors in
certain rooms occupied and frequented
by members of the Law School; there-
fore, be it

Resolved, That we discountenance
such unseemly practice of these stu-
dents, as we feel it is an unjust re-
flection on the character and habits of
the members of this class; further-
more, be it

Resolved, That we implore, in the
name of justice, of commonsense and
decency, that those who heretofore
have engaged in such practice will dis-
continue it while in and about the
buildings of the University of Ne-
braska.

The Debating Board in the selection
of the members for the Wisconsin
team has completed its most difficult
work of the year. This year Nebras-
ka's inter-state squad has been com-
posed of a bunch of exceptionally
strong men, and as the time came for
the selection of a team the Board real-
ized the close work it would take to
choose the best qualified men. The
work of the men has been followed
most closely during the entire season,
and every point of strength noted as
well as every point of weakness. The
men have entered the contest with the
best of spirit, and have worked hard,
consequently it has been one of the
greatest intellectual battles ever
fought out for place on a Nebraska de-
bating team.

The men selected: Hough, Marvin
and Sunderlin, are well qualified for
the position they have been given. Two
of the men, Marvin and Sunderlin,
have represented Nebraska in inter-
state debate before Sunderlin on the
Iowa team of last year and Marvin on
the same team. Hough, the other man
on the team, appears for the first time
in debating, but he is without a doubt
one of the strongest men that ever up-

held the Nebraska side of any ques-
tion in debate. Three alternates were
selected to back up the first three men.
They are Levy, Swenson, and Wheeler.
Levy and Swenson were both on the
teams last year, and are strong men
to rely upon.

There has been no words of con-
demnation against the Debating Board,
for everyone realizes that they have
done their work well, and selected the
men who will uphold Nebraska's pres-
tige to the high standard already at-
tained.

Kansas Fellowships.

Registrar Clark is in receipt of the
following from the University of Kan-
sas:

Announcement of Fellowships.—
Eleven graduate-teaching Fellowships,
yielding \$215 each, are offered by the
University of Kansas for the year
1906-7, in the following named depart-
ments: German, Romance Languages,
English Literature, Education, Mathe-
matics, Chemistry, American History,
European History, Sociology, and Eco-
nomics, Philosophy, and Botany.

Fellows are required to devote not
more than seven hours per week to
some service in connection with the
University, and are supposed to give
their time primarily to the work of one
department.

A graduate of any college of good
standing may become a candidate for
a Fellowship. Attention is called to
the large and well equipped libraries
and laboratories of the University and
the large number of teachers offering
work, all of which makes possible
great differentiation of courses and
specialization in the desired line of
work.

Applications for Fellowships must
be made to the Chancellor of the Uni-
versity, and should be on file not later
than the first day of May.

Blanks may be had on application.
