## WELL ATTENDED

LARGE CROWD ATTENDS GYM-  
NASTIC EXHIBITION.

A Very Good Program Rendered by  
Gymnasium Classes—A Suc-  
cess Financially.

The gymnasium exhibition, as pre-  
dicted, was one of the most enjoyable  
university functions of the year. The  
largest crowd of the year, with the  
exception of Charter day, was crowd-  
ed into the Armory, every seat of the  
five hundred was occupied and people  
were standing. The crowd started to  
gather about 7:15 and by 8:00 p. m.  
the seats were all full. There were  
two or three little inconveniences  
which prevented the program from  
beginning at 8 o'clock as advertised,  
but these were inadvertent.

The first event on the program was  
the drill by the first-year class, led by  
Mr. Hawthorne, Dr. Clapp, assistant.  
Over one hundred men participated  
in this, and the precision and uni-  
formity with which they performed  
every part of the drill won for them  
much applause and praise. The drill  
was given by music, and the men kept  
in perfect time. This was followed  
closely by a boxing exhibition from  
the class in boxing conducted by  
Messrs. Best, Hewitt and Hale. After  
the general exhibition, Hale and Hew-  
itt "mixed" for a lively bout, and the  
men proved to the spectators that  
they had more than the ordinary abil-  
ity. The ducking and footwork of  
these men was exceptionally good, and  
they did not appear to be afraid to  
land on each other when the oppor-  
tunity presented itself.

The girls' second-year class in gym-  
nastics gave a drill led by Miss Towne.  
This, as well as the weaving dance  
by the girls, was the strong feature  
of the program. They showed the  
course of training that the students  
have undergone to bring about so  
nearly a perfect drill. The applause  
was very liberal when the girls left  
the floor and even more so after the  
weaving dance. The weaving dance  
was something new to Lincoln people,  
as it had never been put on before  
in the Armory, but it is quite likely  
that it will become a permanent fea-  
ture in gymnastic entertainments here-  
after.

Following the girls' drill there was  
an event which furnished as much en-  
tertainment as anything on the pro-  
gram. This was the apparatus work  
done by the first-year students. Squads  
of ten had been selected for the six  
different pieces of work, and with  
the Cadet Band playing, this part of  
the program was indeed very good.  
The second-year class gave some long  
horse work immediately after this  
part of the program. The Hamburg  
drill, given by these students, was one  
of the prettiest drills on the list. The  
men dressed in white duck trousers,  
shirt waists and canvas shoes, and  
drilling without any commands,  
brought forth many exclamations of  
praise from the audience.

The inter-class relay race proved to  
be a victory for the Freshmen, with

lights being turned out, this made a  
very pretty effect.

The exhibition was as much of a  
success financially as it was otherwise.  
Something like \$100 will be cleared, as  
\$125 was taken in at the door, and  
the expenses were very small this  
year. This will be sufficient to bear  
the expenses of the gymnastic team to  
Madison, Wis.

Dr. Clapp wishes to thank the stu-  
dent committee, Crites, Myers, Van  
Orsdel, Jorgensen, Lundin and Ram-  
sey, for their help in carrying on the  
exhibition.

## DEFEAT ALUMNAE

SENIORS WIN A CLOSE GAME OF  
BASKET-BALL

Score of 21-19 Result of Senior Girls  
Vs. Alumnae Game on Satur-  
day in the Armory.

The varsity girls defeated the alum-  
nae at basket ball on Saturday after-  
noon. Miss Pound and Mrs. Clapp had  
gathered in all their old proteges from  
out over the state for this contest, but  
they were unable to conquer the Ne-  
braska varsity girls. If reports are  
true, the alumnae team lacked a little  
in wind when it came to playing the  
fast first team. The score at the end  
of the game stood 21-19.

At the start of the game it looked as  
if the varsity girls were doomed to  
their first defeat in several years, for  
the opponents seemed to rush them off  
their feet, and the score was all for  
the alumnae. But the team work of  
the varsity girls soon came into use  
and they played all around the old  
stars of the game. It appeared as if  
some of the alumnae were glued to  
the floor from the way they moved.  
Again and again time was called for  
rest and the opponents of the varsity  
would quietly steal away for a few  
seconds of fresh air.

At the beginning of the second half  
the alumnae made the same phenome-  
nal start, but, alas, they must soon  
tire from the strenuousness, and the  
varsity again obtain a lead. From  
this until the end the varsity were  
the winners, although it was very  
close. The alumnae contend that they  
did not want to spoil the record of  
the varsity, consequently they did not  
rush the game as much as they would  
have otherwise. But they must be  
commended for the excellent game  
they put up without any previous  
practice. A few years ago an alumnae  
team attempted to lower the varsity  
banner, but they were hopelessly de-  
feated by a score of 43-4.
