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The University year is divided into four Quarters, Winter, Spring, Summer, and Autumn. Admission is granted at the opening of each, on January 2d, April 2d, June 10th, and October 1st.

Graduate instruction is offered in the Graduate Schools of Arts and Literature and in the Ogden (Graduate) School of Science.

Professional instruction is offered in the Divinity School, the Law School, Rush Medical College (affiliated), and the School of Education.

Summer Quarter 1907, June 16-September 2. First Term: June 16-July 26; Second Term: July 27-August 31. Registration is permitted for the entire quarter or for either term. Full and regular credit is given for work done. Special courses are offered for teachers.
