



Dean Dangerously III.

Union Medical College.

Dean Ward of the University has received an announcement of the Union Medical College, opened in Peking, China, on February 14th, 1906; it was established to provide well-educated Chinese with as thorough a knowledge as possible of the various branches of medicine and surgery. The announcement is printed both in Chinese and in English and outlines a strong course, while the clinical facilities offered are extensive. The faculty, which is drawn chiefly from the medical missionaries, includes Dr. F. F. Tucker, a graduate of the University of Nebraska, who is well known here as a former teacher in the Lincoln High School. The high standing of the new college appears not only in its facilities and course of study, but also in the fact that the examining board is composed of the ranking medical attaches from the Peking legations of the six great nations.
