A good crowd witnessed the initial battle on "Ducky Holmes'"diamond yesterday, the bleachers being packed and the grandstand well filled. "Ducky's" Bryanites lined up against the Minneapolis team of the American Association, and though the score showed thirteen chalk marks to the credit of the Millers, to only six credit mark for the Bryanites, yet the multitude seemed well pleased.

A fair estimate could hardly be made of the strength of the team as several men have not yet arrived and their positions were being filled by others. The field was very heavy after the recent rains and at times the players could barely move in their tracks. Nevertheless some good sharp plays were made and the team with practice and a little experience playing together will undoubtedly prove a strong one. The Millers had considerable advantage as they have been playing together for some time and have a number of their last year men, who were team mates before.

Lincoln opened with C. Holmes in the box and the visitors seemed to find his curves at will. In the fifth McCormick was put in and he succeeded in holding the enemy down a little better. McCormick was with Creighton University of Omaha last year and is making his debut among professional company. He pitched only two innings and chalked up three strike outs to his credit. He gives promise of being a good man as soon as he gets his "sea legs" and a little more confidence in himself.

Today and tomorrow "Ducky's" boys will try out with the varsity and a large crowd is expected down at Antelope park. This will be a double attraction, as the spectators will have a chance to get a line on the actions of Captain Morse's men as well as the Bryanites.

After the two games with the varsity, Manager Holmes has two games scheduled with Milwaukee—April 9th and 10th.
