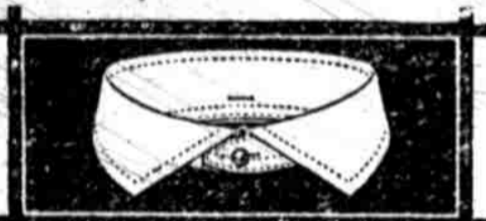

CLASSICAL ASSOCIATION MEETS.

Annual Session of the Classical Association of the Middle West.

Professor Barber will leave for St. Louis next Wednesday to attend the annual meeting of the Classical Association of the Middle West and South, the executive committee of which he has long been a member. The association will be in session at Brookings Hall, Washington University, May 4 and 5, inclusive.

The Classical Association, consisting as it does of over a thousand members and representing twenty-three states and territories, is one of the largest organizations of its kind in existence. At the meeting next week papers will be read and addresses given by instructors from the following universities: Michigan, Chicago, Wisconsin, Missouri, Notre Dame, Kansas, Indiana, Princeton, St. Louis, Nebraska and Washington; in addition to which, discussions will be carried on by representatives from various high schools and academies throughout the West. The Omaha high school will be represented by Miss Bessie J. Snyder.

The principal address of the occasion will be delivered by Professor W. G. Hale of the University of Chicago on "The Quantitative Pronunciation of Latin, and Its Meaning for Latin Versification." Professor Hale is one of the leading classical scholars in America.

The meeting will close with a banquet tendered the men of the Association by the Board of Trustees of the Missouri Botanical Garden, Saturday evening. This banquet, which is known as the Shaw banquet, is provided from the Shaw fund, a gift made to the Botanical Gardens by the late G. S. Shaw to be used for such occasions as this. The ladies of the Association will also be entertained on this evening by the following clubs: Wednesday Club, College Club, St. Louis chapter of the Association of Collegiate Alumni, and the Washington University Alumnae.

Dr. Bessey at Ames.

Last week Professor Bessey went to Ames College, Iowa, to attend the meeting of the Iowa Academy of Science and to take part in dedicating the new rooms of the Department of Botany. The professor was much pleased to find his old department in such fine quarters. It has had a whole floor in the new Central Hall assigned to it, numbering twenty-six rooms in all. On Sunday he spoke in chapel to the students and faculty.
