CLASSICAL ASSOCIATION MEETS.
Annual seseion of the Classical Association of the Middie West.
Protessor Barber will leave for st. Louls next Wednesday to attend the annual meeting of the Classical Assoclation of the Middle West and South, the executive committee of which he has long been a member. The association will be in session at Brookings Hall, Washington University, May and 5; inclusive.
The Classical Association, consist ing as it does of over a thousand members and representing twenty-three states and territories, is one of the largest organizations of its kind in existance. At the meeting next week papers will be read and addresses given by instructors rrom the followIng universities: Michigan, Chicago Wisconsin, Missouri, Notre Dame, Kansas, Indlana, Princeton, St. Louls, Nebraska and Washington; in addition to which, discussions will be carried on by representatives from various high schools and academles throughout the West. The Omaha high school will be represented by Miss Bessle J. Snyder.
The principal address of the occasion will be delivered by Professor w. G. Hale of the University of Chicago on "The Quantative Pronunclation of Latin, and Its Meaning for Latin Versification." Professor Hale is one of the leading classleal scholars in America
The meeting will close with a banquet tendered the men of the Association by the Board of Trustees of the Missouri Botanical Garden, Saturday evening. This banquet, which is known as the Shaw banquet, is provided from the Shaw fund, a gift made to the Botanical Gardens by the late G. S. Shaw to be used for such occasions as this. The ladies of the Assoclation will also be entertained on this evening by the following clubs: Wednesday Club, College Club, St. Louls chapter of the Assoclation of Collegiate Alumni, and the Washing. ton University Alumnae.
