MUST REGISTER

REGISTRATION SYSTEM FOR ATHLETIC BOARD ELECTIONS.

Students Register from May 2d to 5th, inclusive—This System Adopted by Unanimous Vote of Board.

The committee appointed by the Athletic Board at its special meeting last Friday, April 27, made a report to the Board at its regular meeting yesterday morning, May 1. This committee consisted of Dr. R. G. Clapp, Dr. T. L. Bolton and William Hoar, and they were instructed to devise and recommend to the Board some scheme by which the "petty politics" and "slush fund" element of the election of student members to the Athletic Board could be eliminated.

The following recommendations were accepted and approved by the Board:

Rules for Registration of Voters for Election of Student Members of the Athletic Board—To be eligible to vote for a student member to the Athletic Board all persons must be registered and pay a fee of twenty-five cents, which shall make him eligible to vote at such elections.

Students, ex-students, alumnae and members of the faculty may become qualified to partake in such elections by complying with rules governing registration.

Persons wishing to become qualified voters shall present themselves in person to the registration board herein to be provided for.

A student shall inscribe his name, class and school in a book kept for that purpose. Ex-students shall inscribe their names, school and year or years of attendance. Alumnae shall inscribe their names, school and year of graduation. Faculty members shall inscribe their names, school and the department in which they work.

Identification of any person attempting to register or vote may at any time be called for.

The registration board shall consist of three men, who shall sit two hours a day, from eleven a. m. to one p. m. each day, from May 2 to May 5, inclusive, for the purpose of registering all those who wish to vote for student members of the Athletic Board on Wednesday, May 1st.

The committee recommended applications of nominees for Athletic Board members be accepted as late as May 8, instead of May 1st, and in consequence of this the election date was postponed from May 9 to May 16.

Y. M. C. A. Meeting.

The prayer meeting tonight will be led by Mr. Jas. Anderson. A discussion as to how college men should spend their Sundays will be taken up and this will be of interest to a great number. Defends University.

It is encouraging to find such supporters of the University throughout the state as is the editor of the Ashland Gazette. The following is an editorial which appeared recently in the columns of that paper:

Some weeks ago a local preacher attacked the religious spirit of the state university in an open address at a union meeting of the city churches, asserting that the institution was a "hotbed of infidelity," and that its students and graduates were generally infidels of the worst type. The Ashland Gazette challenged the statement and made inquiry of the registrar of the state university for information concerning the religious character of the life at the institution. The Gazette has since printed a statement from the registrar that makes an interesting showing. It shows that of all the instructional staff with the rank of professor, associate professor, assistant professor and adjunct professor, sixty per cent are members of some church and nearly all are attendants at some church. The university Y. M. C. A. has 300 members, the university Y. W. C. A. 360 members. Of the 594 freshmen 373 are church members, 187 church adherents and 34 have no affiliation. The other classes run about the same. Of the total attendance but five per cent have no affiliation with any church. Almost every church in Lincoln is shown to have a university class in its Sunday school. Out of the eleven fraternities, seven have weekly Bible classes conducted by the secretary of the university Y. M. C. A. or one of their members. These classes meet in the chapter houses usually Sunday afternoons or on some evening in the week.

In addition the Gazette calls attention to the fact that Chancellor E. Benj. Andrews is one of the best known Baptist preachers in the west, while the largest Bible class in the First Baptist Sunday school is composed entirely of university students. Religious exercises are conducted every morning in the state university chapel by the different pastors of Lincoln.
