To Lower Requirements.

"The Illini" for May 1st says:

"Seventy instead of seventy-five will be the required passing grade after the beginning of the next school year. This change was the result of the action of the University Senate at one of its recent meetings. The change was not arrived at by a unanimous vote of all the members; some of the older and more conservative men contending that it would tend to lower the standard of scholarship, while those in favor argued that it would allow a grading which would more closely conform to the standards of perfection. Grades from 60 to 69 will condition the student, from 70 to 79 will be considered poor, from 80 to 89 good, while, all above will be counted as excellent. Almost all of the leading universities have a lower passing average than that required here, and it is urged that in not a single instance does the lowering of the passing grade tend to lower the standard of scholarship."
