The Senior Book, which has been in the process of construction for the past six months, is now completed and those who have been in charge expect to have it ready for distribution next Tuesday at chapel time. This, in all probability, will be the last Senior Book published at the University of Nebraska, and for that reason, if for no other, the members of the board have devoted their best efforts to make it a creditable publication.

One innovation this year is a permanent cover made of Japanese wood. This has been instituted at a considerable expense. The book will be sold in spite of this at the usual price, seventy-five cents. A member of the board stated to a Nebraskan reporter yesterday, however, that while the cover was wooden, the jokes were not.
