With this action on the part of Harvard toward football, it is quite likely that the game will be re-inaugurated in most, if not all, of the eastern schools.

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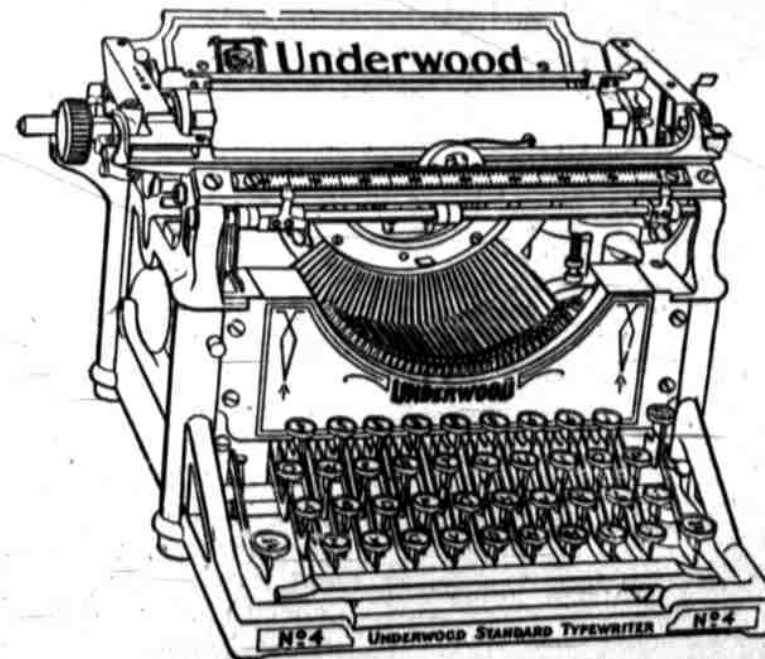
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
