IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

Kansas University at Outs With Missouri and Iowa.

The following are editorials and news items taken from the Missouri "Independent" and the "Daily Iowan":

"From the stories that are being sent out of Lawrence, Kansas, of late one would be led to conclude that Missouri University students were muckers of the most refined type and that Kansas University men fall little short of being angels. This year there was a hitch in the proceedings incident to the holding of the ninth annual debate, and why? The Kansans are making use of every opportunity to tell the world that it was all because Missouri was unwilling to do the square thing. It has been intimated that Missouri wanted to fix the judges by choosing for judges alumni of this institution, or men who had sons in the University, or men who were married to corporations and hence would be unable to give an impartial decision.

"Our friends from Kansas may tell about their desire to do the square thing, but their whole dealings with the University of Missouri within the last three years at least disprove any such desire. In that time we have had more trouble securing judges and arranging other matters with them than with Texas and Illinois combined. Indeed, we have never had any trouble with the last-named institutions during our relations with them. We were determined this year to have a square deal with Kansas or none at all. Since the conduct of the Kansans evidenced a desire to repeat their trick of last year we refused to be a party."

"The debate which was to have been held between the Laws of Iowa and Kansas has been dropped. It was found difficult to adjust all the details to the satisfaction and convenience of both teams, and so representatives of the two schools will not meet this year."

Chicago to Meet Cornell on Gridiron.
 Chicago will play Cornell. Although wishing to cut down her schedule so as to admit only small colleges, the Midway institution has decided to take on Cornell for football. She has so drawn the line of distinction between large and small colleges as to just exclude Michigan and admit Cornell. The following dispatch from Chicago is self-explanatory:

Chicago, May 14.—Chicago will have at least one big football game next fall. Cornell will play on Marshall field on November 10.

Arrangements were completed last night by Director Stagg and word was sent to Ithaca authorities of his acceptance. Cornell, it is stated, proposed the game. Stagg received word from the eastern officials a week ago, but was unable to work upon it until he had presented the proposition to the Midway senate for consideration.

More weighty than anything which the Chicago ruling body has had to handle in recent years, it was declared by one of the leading Chicago professors, was the question of whether the Midway institution should accept or reject the offer of Cornell. By deciding to grant permission to play the easterners the senate saved Stagg to the university and saved the ranking of the institution as an athletic power, and consequently the ranking of the school to a certain extent.

Coach Warner of Cornell expects to have one of the best teams in years at Ithaca next fall, while the prospects at the Midway at present point to an even greater team than the championship eleven of last fall.
