recently held an election in spite of  
our protest against the system; there-  
fore, be it

"Resolved, That we reaffirm our  
stand against the system now in  
vogue; and, be it

"Resolved, That we take a further  
step to convince the Athletic Board  
that the students are behind the move-  
ment and appoint a committee to cir-  
culate petitions asking the board to  
remove the tax; and, be it further

"Resolved, That we invite the mem-  
bers of the Athletic Board to prove by  
the result of the recent election that  
the majority of the students favor  
their system and that it will eliminate  
the corruption, vote-buying and ques-  
tionable work done in connection with  
the Athletic Board election."


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
