book. Many cuts are presented which make many of the roasts very clear and in some places ludicrous. On the whole, the cuts in the Law Book are much better than those appearing in the Senior Annual. The professors as well as the students are shown no mercy in any of the write-ups or jokes. On the whole, the book is a very creditable production and reflects much credit upon its editors and managers.

"The Arena" for May.

The May "Arena" is very strong in its fine literary and artistic features. "What Our Universities Are Doing for American Literature" is a deeply philosophical and searchingly thoughtful paper by Edwin Davies Schoonmaker, the talented author of "The Saxons." The well-known and popular author, George Wharton James, contributes a magnificently illustrated paper on Charles H. Grant, the famous marine painter, and his work. This contribution carries a number of excellently executed half-tone reproductions of Mr. Grant's paintings. General Simon Bolivar, the liberator of northern South America, is the subject of another illustrated paper in this issue, prepared by the eminent student of South American history, Professor Frederic M. Noa. Among subjects of deep interest to thoughtful students of American civic life are the following: "Criminal Wealth versus Common Honesty," by Albert Brandt; "The Railways of Colorado," by Hon. J. Warner Mills; "The British Labor Party: Its Aims and Aspirations," by William Diack; "The Value of an Immigrant," by Hon. Robert Baker; "Where the People Really Rule," a story of Oregon under direct legislation, and "Why We Favor Municipal Ownership," two extended editorials by Mr. Flower.
