PROF. M. M. FOGG IN OMAHA.

Attends Debate Celebration of Omaha High School.
Prof. M. M. Fogg went to Omaha on last Friday to attend a debate celebration at the Omaha High School. The exercises were in the afternoon, with Principal Waterhouse presiding. The principal address of the afternoon was given by Professor Fogg on the subject "Training." Hon. John L. Webster, of Omaha, was to have delivered an address, but owing to unavoidable circumstances could not be present. Professor Fogg's address was received very enthusiastically, and much spirit was shown over debating work. The meeting was attended by the entire student body.
The debating work in Omaha has been in the hands of Charles M. Bracelin, Nebraska '02, for the past three years. Mr. Bracelin has taught history and debating in Omaha High ever since he left the University, and in that time Omaha has won every debate against the Lincoln High School. He was an interstate debater while in Nebraska. Omaha has the best record of any high in the state for debating. This year they have won three victories, and lost no debate. Those they have defeated are: Lincoln, Des Moines, and tied with Blair.
