Former Student Suicides.

News from Denver says: William Wilson, formerly of Lincoln, committed suicide at Grand Junction, Colo., by shooting. Mr. Wilson was the son of William Wilson, a pioneer of Lancaster county. He leaves a wife and child. No cause is known for his deed. He had appeared despondent on account of having failed to pass an examination for promotion from the position of fireman to that of engineer on the Rio Grande railroad. He was formerly a student at the University of Nebraska and served in the Seventh regiment, United States volunteers, during the Spanish-American war and was at the battle of El Caney. His brother, Hugh Wilson, is division superintendent on the Missouri Pacific railroad. The latter has gone to Grand Junction to bring the body to Lincoln for burial.

Mr. Wilson visited the University about two months ago and seemed enthusiastic about the west and his prospects there.
