The Athletic Board held a meeting Tuesday afternoon of this week and chose Mr. T. M. Stuart as assistant coach. Mr. Stuart has played on the Michigan team for the last two years and was a member of the Denver University team for the two years previous. He is a famous end and an excellent punter.

The Board also decided to place on sale season tickets for the games to be played in Lincoln. General admission will be \$3.00 and grandstand reservations will cost \$5.00 per book. These ticket books can be obtained at the office of the University Treasurer in the Administration Building, or at Harry Porter, 1123 O street, commencing Wednesday, September 26th.

The new charging machine, designed to develop speed in charging in the line and built according to the Yost pattern, has been set up on the Athletic Field and will be put into use at once. This machine will be one of the features of the work this Fall and great things are expected from it.

A new feature in gymnasium work that will cause no little interest among those interested in general athletics is announced by Dr. Clapp. In his Physical Education courses 13 and 15, one hour each week is to be devoted to swimming in the new pool at the city Y. M. C. A. and at least a part of an hour in every week is to be given to elementary training in boating. Both of these features should prove very attractive to University men.

The Y. M. C. A. reception to University men, which was to have been given tonight, has been postponed until next Saturday when it will be held either in the Armory or in Art Hall. As this will be the first reception given by the Association this year every male student is urged to attend.

Judging from present indications, this will be the most prosperous year in the history of the University Association. Chairman White, of the Bible Study Committee, predicts a membership of five hundred in his department; A. E. Wolf, of the Mission Study Committee, one hundred; while Chairman Swan, of the committee on membership, hopes to pass the five hundred mark before Christmas.

In addition to this anticipated increase in numbers, the Association will have a budget of thirteen hundred dollars, an increase of four hundred dollars over last year's expenses.

Mr. der Kindern, the new Y. M. C. A. secretary, arrived in the city from his home in Indiana early this week and entered at once upon his official duties. Mr. der Kindern is a graduate of Purdue University, class of '06, where he spent several years in Y. M. C. A. work.
