### PROFESSOR WALLACE BACK.

#### Returns from Two Years of Study Abroad.

Professor Wallace, who has been studying in Europe the past two years, arrived in Lincoln yesterday afternoon and will meet his classes today.

Upon leaving the University in the spring of 1904, Professor Wallace went to England, where he carried on some original investigations in the interests of his department, English Literature. It was during this research work that he discovered the Shakespearean relic referred to in Associated Press dispatches at the time as William Shakespeare's "meat bill."

In the fall of that year Professor Wallace went to Germany, where he took his degree as Doctor of Philosophy this spring.

During the past summer Dr. Wallace traveled in Italy and Greece, returning to America early this month.

#### University Journal.

The University Journal, which has been issued for the last two years under the direction of Mr. T. M. Hodgman, will henceforth be under the editorial supervision of Professor H. K. Wolfe. Dr. Wolfe was formerly principal of the Lincoln High School and went from there to the University of Montana, where he was in the Department of Education. Professor Wolfe is at present professor of Educational Psychology in this University. In his work on the University Journal Professor Wolfe will be assisted by an able corps of assistants.

#### Students' Reception.
