ed Then Nebraska gained the ball in the center of the field and Benedict went around the left end for ten yards on a quarter-back play. More fumbling occurred and the ball changed hands several times until Benedic circled the end for thirty-five yards and Little went over for a touchdown Cook kicked an easy goal and the score was 6-0.

"McDougal, Hastings' captain and star, kicked to Ewing, who was downed in his tracks. Little "Bennie" then tried a quarterback play and went down the field for a sixty-five yard run, only stopping when the goal posts were behind him. Again Cook kicked goal making the score 12-0.

McDougal kicked to Denslow, who returned to the 40-yard line where Nebraska was forced to try a punt. Wilkie threw the ball over Cook's head and "Pip" was forced to run it down on the 30-yard line, returning it, however to the 40-yard line before being downed. Nebraska was then penalized ten yards for offside play, but carried the ball to Hastings' 50yard line, where she was held for downs. Hastings tried a quarterback kick which bounded into Cook's arms and the rooters came to their feet with a roar as the speedy little end dodged his opponents and ran sixty yards for the third touchdown. Again Cook kicked goal. Score 18-0.

McDonald replaced eBnedict at quarterback and McDougal kicked to Schmidt, who was downed on the 35yard line as time was called.

The second half was opened by Mc-Dougal kicking to Schmidt, who returned to the 35-yard line. In spite of a heavy penalty of fifteen yards, Nebraska advanced steadily by good old time line smashes and end runs to Hastings' 5-yard line, when Little was sent over for a touchdown. Cook missed the goal and the score was 23-0.

Cook kicked to Hastings and Nebraska got the ball by a blocked kick on Hastings' 15-yard line. Mason smashed the line a few times and went over for the fifth touchdown.

The line-up was shifted considerably at this stage of the game, Johnson going in as right tackle, Drain replacing McDonald at quarter and McDonald taking Denslow's place at end. Little was shifted to Cook's end and Craig was called out to fill the half-back's place.

Hastings kicked off to Mason, who received the ball on the 5-yard line and ran down the field for seventy yards before he stumbled and was downed. Drain then advanced the ball to the 10-yard line and Mason went over for touchdown number six.

Hastings kicked off and Nebraska advanced steadily to her opponent's 45-yard line when Drain circled the right end making another touchdown. McDonald missed goal. Score 40-0.

Another kickoff brought the ball on Nebraska's 35-yard line and the forward pass was worked again, letting Little get away for a 70-yard run to a touchdown. Schmidt kicked goal.

By end runs and a forward pass the ball was again brought to Hastings' 5yard line and Mason sent over. Mclionald missed goal. Score 51-0.
