Dr. Ward's Talk at Y. M. C. A.

Dr. H. B. Ward, Dean of the Department of Medicine addressed University men at the regular 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon meeting last Sunday. The subject of his talk was, "The Price of Success." He said that it was the ambition of every man to succeed in life, whatever his idea of success might be. One of the things necessary for a successful life was a sound body. "Statistics showed that the average Nebraska student was a little taller, no broader, but a little thicker than the students of eastern institutions. This meant more lung space, and more life. Students entering the University usually divide into two classes, one class devoting most of their time to books, the other giving most time to athletics. There is a happy medium between these extremes which some men have found and which all should find.

The power of concentration is necessary to success and should be developed.

To obtain the highest success one must sacrifice many pleasures and interests in order to concentrate upon a certain definite line of work.
