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Forestry Notes.

Messrs. C. J. Humphrey and F. W. Morrell who completed the work in the Forestry course at the State University last June, and Mr. E. O. Sleske, of the Class of 1905, have entered the United States Forest Service as Forest Assistants at an initial salary of one thousand dollars and field expenses. Mr. Humphrey is at present stationed at Pottsville, Penn., where he is making investigations pertaining to the treatment of telephone poles to prolong their durability. Mr. Morrell has been assigned as Technical Assistant on the Holy Cross Forest Reserve in Colorado, with headquarters at Glenwood Springs. Mr. Sleske has spent the past summer in an extended study of forest planting in the Truckee-Carson Irrigation Project in Nevada.

Mr. O. T. Swan, who has been with the United States Forest Service as Forest Assistant since July, 1905, was given a substantial promotion last July. He is stationed at Los Angeles, California, where he is conducting experiments in the seasoning and treating of telephone and telegraph poles.

Mr. G. A. Pearson of the Class of 1906 returns this year to assist in the Department of Forestry and for his Master's degree.

Archie Sears, '06 Engineering, is serving his first year in the General Electrical Works, the big electrical concern in Schenectady, Pennsylvania. His sister Maybelle, who was attending University last year, is studying art at the Philadelphia Art School. Miss Sears illustrated the Senior Annual last year.

Mr. Leslie N. Goodding, '04, has been elected assistant in Forestry and Botany at the Arizona Agricultural College. He has been put in charge of one of the sub-stations of the territory.

Walter Shindoll, '07, will not attend the University this semester, having accepted a position as maintenance engineer for the Burlington railroad with headquarters in Lincoln.

M. J. Mower, '05, has gone to Chicago, where he will take his A. M. degree at the University of Chicago in the spring. Mr. Mower was a member of the graduate school last year.
