In the Evening News of last Saturday there appeared under the caption "Ways of Fair Co-Eds Inspire Dissipation" what was ostensibly a communication from a male student of the University. The article was in the nature of a reply to the recent agitation against the crowds of smokers that have been accustomed to collect at the gates of the campus at Convocation period and while it was written in a would-be humorous way, yet it reflected somewhat seriously upon the co-eds in several particulars.

We are not inclined to overestimate the importance of the article in question but we do believe that the News is seriously at fault in headlining so

this year would be optimistic thru all that should happen or whether a discouraging situation would produce "knockers" or, still worse, silence. There were discouraging situations in plenty during the forty-three minutes of play on Saturday afternoon and it is vastly to the credit of the bleachers that not once was there a visible depression but rather an increased volume of cheering at every setback.

Much credit is due to the rooting leaders, Messrs. Slaughter and McWilliams, for the unusual ability they displayed not simply in directing the old yells that have become a fixed part of all athletics at Nebraska, but in formulating new ones on the spur of the moment that were especially effective at critical points in the game. In our estimation one of the new yells produced on Saturday bids fair to become a classic.

The spirit of fair play was particularly noticeable also. The time of hooting the opposing side has, we hope, past out of Nebraska athletics forever and on Saturday there was but one incident of unsportsmanlike nature. It was purely individual and was, we are glad to note, promptly "called down" by the rooting leaders. As an institution supporting clean athletics we cannot afford to permit any conduct toward the visiting team that can in any way reflect upon the University and we hope that the rooting leaders will continue to recognize their responsibility along this line.

On next Saturday some new football songs will be in evidence and if they are adopted with the same spirit of loyalty and enthusiasm that was displayed on Saturday last, another stride will have been effected toward the goal of the perfect support that the Team should have under any and all circumstances. We urge a doubled megaphone section for next Saturday.
