Herbert Burke Murdered in Omaha-No Trace of Assassin.

Miss Marguerite Burke was called to Omaha Monday by the sudden death of her brother, Herbert. Mr. Burke was found dead Monday morning at the Florence waterworks station: His appearance showed that he had been the victim of foul play, but no trace of the murderer, nor clue of any kind, has yet been found by the Omaha police. No cause has as yet been assigned for the atrocious deed, as Mr. Burke's watch, money and the other valuables on his person were unmo-

Herbert Burke was a University student, having spent a year at the Agricultural College.

He spent the summer in the commission office of his father and uncle in South Omaha, and had all arrangements made to re-enter the University at the coming fall registration. He was twenty years of age, a bright and promising young man, well liked by all who knew him, and no one knows that he ever had an enemy.

He is survived only by his sister Marguerite and his mother. Their loss is made the harder to bear because of the death of his father also, less than a month ago.
