Professor Caldwell's conference in
American History entered upon its

for book reviews, discussion of theses,
and occasional addresses by specialists
in its field.
Students in American History are
reporting to the department unusual
difficulty in obtaining books for library
reading. More duplicates than usual
were added to the department reserve
shelves this year, but an increase of
25 per cent in the American History
classes has more than offset this. The
department uses practically no texts,
depending almost entirely on library
readings and by class and depart-
mental contributions duplicating
standard works in its field. Several
new volumes are now on the way, and
will doubtless remove the present em-
barrassment.
