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**WHAT IS THE MATTER?**

Interest in class football seems to be a minus quantity in the University this year. A plea was made early this month for prompt action on the part of class officials in the appointment of football managers and coaches but at the present time with all the classes thoroly organized and with the football season over a third past, only one class team has even made a start.

Class football is the one means of arousing class enthusiasm at this time of the year that is recognized by the authorities as entirely legitimate. And, indeed, if enthusiastically conducted, an inter-class schedule affords an excellent outlet for a vigorous display of class loyalty and genuine University spirit. The University cannot permit it to drop out of the list of traditional competitions without suffering a decided loss.

Unless action on the part of the class presidents and the officials they appoint is taken at once, class football is doomed for the year. If it goes by the board this year it will be harder to reinstate next fall and a still longer lapse would probably prove fatal. As it is, even tho teams were formed at once, the inter-class championship series must drag over the natural limit of the football season and there will be a decided hindrance to good games in the way of inclement weather and a frozen field.

For the good of your class and for the name of the University, we urge you, Mr. Class President, to act immediately in this matter, and we further urge that every man who ever in his inmost soul had a desire to play football, get out on the athletic field every day at the Convocation hour and do the best he can to make his class team a strong and representative organization.

A notice has been sent to all instructors that the mid-semester reports will be due Monday, November 19. The examination will take place in the preceding week.

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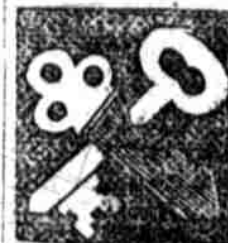
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
