Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 11.—A Track  
and Field Club has been organized at  
Harvard. This institution proposes to  
do for track athletics what the dormi-  
tory crews and class eams are  
doing in "popularizing other branches  
of college sport." It will aim to give  
anyone in the University who wishes  
it a chance to take part in long walks  
or in cross country runs, without com-  
pelling him to enter for a university  
team.

The club started its activities with a  
cross country walk in which over forty  
men took part. The party wore no  
athletic toggery, but was dressed in  
comfortable old clothes that would not  
be hurt by "crossing lots." The "ram-  
ble" was a decided success.

A meeting of the Camera club was  
held last night in the engineering  
building. The club is comparatively  
new, having been organized but one  
year.

An intercollegiate contest is held  
each year in which prizes are given  
for the best collections and best in-  
dividual pictures. The club was or-  
ganized too late last year to enter this  
contest, but it expects to make an ex-  
cellent showing next spring. The prize  
winners in the last contest were Penn-  
sylvania, Wisconsin and Harvard. Af-  
ter being judged the collections are  
sent to the different colleges in turn  
for exhibition.

A local contest was held here last  
spring, when prizes were given by  
Calkins and Lyndon. Other contests  
will be held this year, when prizes  
will be awarded for art and technical  
value, and for the best collections.

Occasionally the club will hold meet-  
ings which will be addressed by facul-  
ty members and professional photog-  
raphers. Several entertainments and  
excursions into the country for pictures  
are also planned.—Michigan Daily.
