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REPUBLICAN CLUB MEETS.

Officers Chosen—Interesting Addresses Delivered.

The University Republican Club held an enthusiastic rally in Memorial Hall Saturday for the purpose of arousing interest among the students for the coming election and for the annual election of officers. The opening speech was made by Mr. McKessen, candidate for state senator from Lancaster County. Robert Cowell, of Omaha, candidate for railroad commissioner, followed with the principal address of the evening. Dr. Winnett, candidate for railroad commissioner, and Ned Brown, candidate for state representative, also made short talks.

Mr. McKessen and Mr. Brown are graduates of this University. Each expressed an appreciation of the opportunity of meeting again with University men, discussed the benefit to be derived from work at the University of Nebraska, and pledged themselves to work for the interest of the University in the legislature if they were elected.

Mr. Cowell and Dr. Winnett discussed the railroad situation in this state and the need of a railway commission. The freight rates from Hastings to Omaha as compared with the rate from Omaha to larger eastern cities was cited as an example of the unjust discrimination now in vogue.

The election of officers resulted in the choice of the following:

President, H. L. Swan; first vice-president, L. A. Winship; second vice-president, T. A. Browne; third vice-president, H. B. Durham; fourth vice-president, B. E. Yoder; fifth vice-president, H. C. Robertson; sixth vice-president, S. M. Rinaker; seventh vice-president, A. J. Heskett; eighth vice-president, S. T. Anderson; secretary, Chas. R. Weeks; treasurer, C. A. Sunderlin; chief of routers, H. G. Myers.

The committee appointed at the last meeting to challenge the Jeffersonian Democratic Club to a joint debate reported that the challenge had been presented, but no reply had been received. The committee was authorized to assume full charge of the debate if the Democratic Club accepted the challenge.

A movement was started to have a regular Republican rooting squad. A chief roter was elected and plans are being pushed to try and secure effective rooting on the occasion of all meetings in which the Republicans are interested.

First Chamber Concert.

The first of a series of concerts of "chamber music" was rendered by the Steckelberg Quartet in Memorial Hall last evening. An appreciative audience heard the program, which was exceptionally well rendered. Another concert of similar nature will be announced before long and a still larger audience is expected. The concert last night was the first "chamber music" ever given under the auspices of the University School of Music.

Barbs Fail to Elect.

Owing to the lack of a quorum at the meeting called yesterday morning the Associated Barbs failed to elect officers for the coming year or to accomplish any other business. Another meeting was at once set for next Tuesday, and it is hoped that more interest will be displayed than was evident yesterday.

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
