THE KANSAS TEAM.

As Seen By Manager Eager In Their Game With Colorado.

According to Manager Eager, who went to Kansas last Saturday specially to witness the Kansas-Colorado game, the Jayhawkers have the strongest team that has ever represented Kansas on the football field. With our line improving every day and the team work becoming more and more perfect, by the time we are ready for Kansas, we should present a defense as strong, and an offense far stronger than our rivals will be able to muster.

The Jayhawkers are coming to Lincoln by the hundreds and the game will be played and witnessed with an intensity that has been but rarely felt on Nebraska Field.

"COLLEGE PATRIOTISM."

Dean Ringer Gives University Men Strong Address.

Mr. J. Dean Ringer, Law '05, spoke last Sunday at the Y. M. C. A. meeting on "College Patriotism." Mr. Ringer's prominence in the University and the interest which he has always taken in school affairs lent his talk especial interest. His talk in brief was as follows:

He first defined patriotic as loyalty to some cause or institution. This he illustrated by Edward Everett Hale's story, "The Man Without a Country." He said that in college life to be loyal we must have some principle deserving of support. We must have high ideals of what our University should be. Athletics should be made clean. When "Bennie" said, "Good work" with regard to the Nebraskan's editorial on "Fair Play" he thought the same. A man should develop himself physically, spiritually and mentally. Men should be fair, square, and above board in class work.

Finally the Y. M. C. A. should have the support of every college man because it helps make one a better patriot.
